News update from Pauline Carmichael: Head of School

'Out of Special Measures!! Fantastic achievement for everyone.

Well we have all survived to the end of term and boy what a year it has been! We have had 2 inspections of our residential provision and 2 Ofsted monitoring visits for the school. Ofsted were satisfied on all occasions with the progress being made towards the areas they had identified for improvement.

Since the last newsletter in the spring term we have had our final monitoring visit which was changed to a section 5 inspection. This involved a full inspection of both the residential provision and the school. As you will all be aware, the outcome was fantastic as we were deemed to have made sufficient progress to now take the school 'OUT OF SPECIAL MEASURES'.

This was a very emotional moment for everyone as Sue Morris King, HMI Ofsted Lead Inspector, read out the official statement to Leadership team, IEB and Local Authority representative. A well-deserved and hard earned outcome for everyone! This could only be achieved as the result of the consistent hard work and dedication of all the staff, Leadership team, IEB, Local Authority and of course, the pupils and parents who have also played their part in this process.

This is really fantastic news for the school as we enter into our new partnership with Shaw Trust as part of the Shaw Education Trust together with Blackfriars and Coppice schools as a multi academy trust (SET MAT).

We can now start the new academic year as a school making improvement and working towards 'Good' and 'Outstanding' status in all categories. This will build on the areas of Leadership and Behaviour which were already graded as 'Good'.

Staffing and Budget: This has been a really difficult year for all schools, but in particular special schools. The funding mechanism of the Local Authority for pupils accessing our schools was reviewed and a new funding formula has been applied. This has resulted in many special schools struggling to make the budget stretch to provide the same standard of support for our pupils. Many schools have had to go through a process of issuing notices of redundancies to staff - sadly we found ourselves in the unenviable position of having to do just this. Leadership were challenged to produce a core staffing structure which would enable us to provide a safe educational environment for our pupils. Unfortunately to enable us to work within the limits of the new budget we had to follow a rigorous selection process to identify staff we would have to lose and to enable staff to request voluntary redundancy. We were able to support some of the voluntary redundancy requests, but this will mean quite a few changes to the staffing structure in September.

We will be saying goodbye to the following staff members:
Jude Tilley (Bursar) who has been with the school for 25 years; Gloria Chase (HLTA); Di Greaves; Louise Hawley; Donna Blackman (TA's); Sylvia Fairbrother (Catering Manager); Chris Malpass (catering assistant and cleaner) and Shani Salter 1:1 TA, Ange Ward from Entrust Catering. 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Three Staffordshire special schools to pioneer work opportunities for students through new trust

THREE schools are to join a new academies trust which will help transform work opportunities for special needs students as they move into adult life.

The plans will see pupils learn work-related skills through a range of community business ventures, such as running their own garden centre, Victorian-style cafe, school farm and stables. And as teenagers prepare to leave school, every family will be assigned an adviser to guide them through the options and follow their progress beyond the age of 19.It could include arranging six-month work placements to help them gain full-time jobs, setting up social groups to keep them in touch with their peers and teaching them independent living skills.

Newcastle's Blackfriars School and The Coppice School are teaming up with Walton Hall School, in Eccleshall, to become the founding schools in the mini-academies chain.

Each school is converting to academy status and will be overseen by the employment and skills charity, the Shaw Trust. Executive Headteacher Jim Kane, who oversees all three schools, said: "It is really exciting. It's about getting youngsters ready for life after school. "At the minute, they may go on to college, where they don't get the same level of support, and some end up at home doing nothing. " For some young people with severe disabilities or learning difficulties, the sort of employment they could go into may be an issue. But the important thing is to keep up their self-esteem.

"The three special schools, along with Blackfriars' further education base in Bucknall, cater for a total of 460 pupils.Post-16 students are already involved in several enterprises. But the expansive grounds at Walton Hall are set to become home to a series of student businesses in future. Mr Kane said: "Once of the ideas is a Victorian cafe, where our youngsters could practise catering and hospitality. We could open the site at weekends, with the public able to visit the school farm as well. "Another possibility is having an equestrian centre."

Dave Humphries is chairman of governors for the Blackfriars and Coppice federation and also sends his 17-year-old daughter Tasha to the further education base. The 47-year-old, from Red Street, said: "Tasha has got profound and multiple learning difficulties and has no communication." From a parent's point of

view, you worry about what happens after further education. "But now the Shaw Trust has given us hope. It's opportunities like helping her with independent living."

Blackfriars pupil William Cooper has already set his sights on becoming a PE coach. The 15-year-old, from Scholar Green, will soon start training as a sports leader. He added: "I'm thinking of being a PE assistant and then growing my skills."

Fifteen-year-old Blackfriars pupil Laura Askey, from Kidsgrove, added: "I'd like to set up a little business looking after homeless animals. It's going to be good."

It provided many learning opportunities where the students worked as a team or an individual.




Year 9 had a Japanese Culture afternoon

Shaw Trust becomes approved schools academy sponsor and forms Shaw Education Trust

Employment, learning and skills charity, Shaw Trust, is combining its expertise with some of the UK's leading educationalists to become an Approved Sponsor for Academies. To do so, it has created a multi-academy trust, entitled the Shaw Education Trust. The Shaw Education Trust will focus on supporting special schools and mainstream schools serving disadvantaged communities.

Three Staffordshire special schools have converted to become academies and will be the first schools to join Shaw Education Trust at the start of the next academic year.

In particular, the Shaw Education Trust aims to address the cliff edge when young people leave school with little or no support to help them in the next stage of their life – a more challenging problem for those with disabilities or living in disadvantaged communities.

The education trust and its schools will not only deliver a first class education to its students and play a lead role in the local communities it serves; its unique Student/School Agreement and graduation scheme will focus on smoothing the transition on leaving school.

Roy O'Shaughnessy, chief executive of Shaw Trust, said: "Becoming an approved academy sponsor is an exciting and logical extension to Shaw Trust's vision of society and the sense of purpose we bring to achieving it. By combining our three decades of employability expertise and with some of the UK's leading educationalists, this unique collaboration focuses on those with most need thereby making a real difference for those the charity was created to serve."
